NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2017

1 Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The charity has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is a small charity.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005 and the Companies Act 2006.

1.2 Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. No amounts are included in the accounts for services donated by volunteers.

1.3 Resources expended

Expenditure, which includes VAT, is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

1.4 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings & equipment

25% per annum, straight line

1.5 Pensions

The charity contributes to The Church of England pension scheme. Contributions are charged in the accounts as they become payable.

1.6 Accumulated funds

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document. They also comply with the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

Appointment of Trustees is governed by Charity's governing document which is consistent with the company's Memorandum and Articles of Association. Trustees are authorised to appoint new Trustees, including filling vacancies arising through resignation or death of an existing Trustee.

None of the Trustees has any beneficial interest in the charity (or in its wholly owned company). All of the Trustees are also members of the company and guarantee to contribute a maximum of £10 in the event of a winding up. The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Significant external risks to funding are covered by the development of a strategic plan which addresses the need for the diversification of funding and activities. Internal risks are addressed by procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects which also aim to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charity's activities. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure they remain appropriate to the evolving scope of work conducted by the charity.

Objectives and activities

The charity's objects are to advance the Christian religion throughout the World in such ways as the Trustees see fit and in particular, but not exclusively, by promoting ecumenical and interfaith understanding. The Trustees have paid careful regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Achievements and performance

The Awareness Foundation was greatly honoured this year when HRH The Countess of Wessex GCVO accepted our invitation to become our Royal Patron.

This year has seen the Awareness Foundation continue to develop its ground-breaking work amongst children and young people through our Ambassadors for Peace and Little Heroes programmes in the Middle East. With the continuing support of Tearfund, and some other donors, we have been able to continue to develop our Ambassadors for Peace programmes which take place in Syria and Iraq. So far, we have enabled over 790 young men and women in Syria and Iraq to begin their journeys as Ambassadors for Peace, as well as an astonishing 2,200 Little Heroes in Syria. These two projects, which are at the very heart of our work, are beacons of hope in a region broken by conflict. In April 2017, our week-long delegation took a mix of Canadian and British business, civic and religious leaders to Lebanon to meet senior clergy, Christian and Muslim, as well as community leaders. Each delegate went home with a wealth of experiences and stories to share with friends, family and colleagues, stories of people of faith who live side-by-side, working together to defeat sectarianism and preserve Lebanon's famous multi-cultural and multi-faith diversity

In May 2017, we began a new programme in Syria which has been many years in preparation. Our Sunday School Teacher Training Programme enabled 33 young teachers from all denominations to plant seeds of love and hope among the children in their churches. The young people were thirsty to learn, and they were very keen to be challenged by us to step out of their comfort zones. Most of the Sunday School teachers are just starting on their journey and every one of them showed a real desire to do their best for the children in their care.

As well as offering practical support for children and young people, we have long been passionate about communication as a vital tool for overcoming lack of knowledge and understanding. This year, we launched new online video channel, 'PAX', which encourages people to become better informed, more tolerant and less apathetic concerning matters of faith. A major element in the launch of PAX was the appointment of the PAX Producer, Josie Child, who is leading this programme. Through PAX, we are tackling huge generational problems concerning faith, such as ignorance and extremism. The PAX programme significantly extends our ability to help Christians live their faith confidently in a diverse world, demonstrating that faith should be a force for good and an agent of peace. We are very grateful to the late Mr Syd Anderson for his very generous support, without which we would not have been able to launch this vital work.

Our work to bring a new understanding between the faiths, ever more necessary in a world threatened by the poison of sectarianism, has continued to thrive through the dedication and skills of The Revd Nadim Nassar, who has spoken at many conferences and on the media in the past year, which often include significant contributions from other faiths. Our Awareness Sunday programme continues to offer people of all faiths an opportunity to dedicate themselves to peace and reconciliation; this year, our main service was held in St. Paul's Cathedral, London, with The Revd Nadim Nassar preaching.

Financial review and reserves policy

Total incoming resources to the Awareness Foundation for the year were £227,781 compared with £208,398 in 2016. There was a net surplus for the year of £30,826 compared with £27,454 in 2016. The charity is expecting to receive a further grant for its core work in 2018.

In view of the current economic difficulties, whilst reserves remain very modest indeed, the Trustees are satisfied with the performance of the charity during the year and the position at 30 June 2017

With such modest reserves, no one could imagine that the Awareness Foundation holds significant financial resources. Our stability remains dependent on the ongoing support of many donors who see the work carried out by the Awareness Foundation as being truly important. The Trustees are deeply grateful for that continuing support. Our aim is to hold reserves sufficient to cover between three and six months' expenditure; not even that modest ambition has proved possible in all recent years. In setting that aim, Trustees seek to ensure that, in the event of a significant unexpected drop in funding, they will have sufficient time to look for ways in which additional funds may be raised whilst not having to discontinue the charity's current activities meanwhile.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE AWARENESS FOUNDATION

We have audited the accounts of Awareness Foundation for the year ended 30 June 2016 set out on pages 10 to 15. These accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 12.

This report is made solely to the charity's trustees, as a body, in accordance with section 43 of the Charities Act 1993 and regulations made under section 44 of that Act. Our audit work has been undertaken so that we might state to the charity's trustees those matters we are required to state to them in an auditors' report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, we do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the charitable company and its trustees as a body, for our audit work, for this report, or for the opinions we have formed.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and auditors

As explained more fully in the statement of trustees' responsibilities, the trustees, who are also the directors of Awareness Foundation for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts and for being satisfied that they give a true and fair view.

The trustees have elected for the accounts to be audited in accordance with the Charities Act 1993 rather than the Companies Act 2006. Accordingly we have been appointed as auditors under section 43 of the Charities Act 1993 and report in accordance with section 44 of that Act.

Our responsibility is to audit and express an opinion on the accounts in accordance with applicable law and International Standards on Auditing (UK and Ireland). Those standards require us to comply with the Auditing Practices Board's Ethical Standards for Auditors.

Scope of the audit of the accounts

An audit involves obtaining evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the accounts sufficient to give reasonable assurance that the accounts are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or error. This includes an assessment of: whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the charity's circumstances and have been consistently applied and adequately disclosed; the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the trustees; and the overall presentation of the accounts. In addition, we read all the financial and non-financial information in the Trustees Annual Report to identify material inconsistencies with the audited accounts. If we become aware of any apparent material misstatements or inconsistencies we consider the implications for our report.

We have undertaken the audit in accordance with the requirements of APB Ethical Standards including APB Ethical Standard - Provisions Available for Small Entities, in the circumstances set out in note 14 to the accounts.
